

Guy Schooling, Chairman of Sworders Fine Art Auctioneers Celebrates a Memorable Milestone

I have been with Sworders for a lifetime, thirty-three years, which is certainly longer than many of our current staff have been alive. When I joined, the auction room was a tiny wooden building in Northgate End, Bishop's Stortford. We had no off-road parking and could only load and unload one small van at a time. The staff comprised a secretary, a part-time porter and me. We were not even the largest auction room in Bishop's Stortford; that title belonged to Watsons, remember them?

We quickly outgrew the site and moved into larger premises in the centre of Stansted Mountfitchet, which we thought would last us for twenty years or more, however, we proceeded to rapidly outgrow this and began the search for a site on which to build our own auction room, a tricky undertaking when such a project required 200-plus car parking spaces.

We identified our current site, a disused gravel works, on Cambridge Road, just outside Stansted. It came with, shall we say, a chequered planning history. We thus spent five years preparing our planning application, commissioning traffic and tree surveys, environmental and wildlife reports, as well as canvassing the support of Parish, District and County Councils and our MP, prior to our successful application; the building itself took barely a year to erect. We chose a radical building technique, a sustainably sourced timber frame with straw bale walls, on to which we applied four coats of lime render, below a sustainably sourced cedar shingle roof.

After much upheaval and life-changing expenses, I am delighted to say that the move to this wonderful, enormous and award-winning building has transformed our business. Sworders are now one of the most successful and respected regional auction rooms in the country, with, I hope, a reputation for providing a great level of service to our clients, be they buyers or sellers. We employ thirty full-time and twenty part-time staff with tremendous specialists who conduct market-leading auctions of Asian Art, 20th Century Design, Fine Jewellery and Watches, Fine Silver, Modern British Art, British and European Furniture and Works of Art, Modern and Contemporary Prints, Fine Wine, Books and much more.

This year marks our 10th anniversary in this building; we moved in March 2008, another blink of the eye which I find extraordinary. We have already enjoyed a wonderful year, conducting the most important house contents sale of the year so far, North Mymms Park, which included a group of nineteen important 16th and 17th century North European tapestries, which sold for a combined total of nearly one million pounds. We continue our celebrations with this wonderful two-day auction, featuring entries from the length and breadth of Britain.

I would like to sincerely thank all our staff, who have worked so tirelessly to put this auction together, so soon after the major undertaking that was the North Mymms Park sale. I also thank our many clients and friends, both buyers and sellers, who have supported us so memorably over the last ten years. We are in a privileged position - we handle wonderful objects for a living - however, even more fulfilling are the friendships and relationships we forge in the process.

I look forward to welcoming as many of you as possible to what promises to be a great summer event.



Martin Bladen Hawke, 7th Baron Hawke, was an English amateur cricketer who played between 1881 and 1911 and captained both England and Yorkshire. He appeared in 633 first class matches including five test matches, four as captain. He scored 16,749 runs with a highest score of 166.

In 1881, Hawke went up to Magdalene College, Cambridge, where he won three cricketing blues between 1882 and 1895. He remains Yorkshire's most successful captain, winning the County Championship eight times. His five test appearances were all in South Africa and he won his four test matches as England captain.

After he retired from playing, he became an influential figure in cricket administration, was elected Yorkshire Club President in 1898 and President of the MCC in 1914. He is often remembered - and disparaged for - his most famous quote 'Pray God, no professional shall ever captain England'.

The Order of Industrial Heroism was instituted in 1923 by the Daily Herald to recognise the deeds of valour by ordinary workers. Eric Gill designed the medal and the certificate which depicts St Christopher bearing the Christ Child. Of the four hundred medals awarded, many were posthumous.

'I wonder if you know the history of the cabinets. They belonged to Bury Hill. I am almost sure to our great grandfather. One was given to our mother and one to aunt Juliana. When aunt Juliana died she left hers to us so that they might come together again.'

Anna Maria would have been familiar with the cabinets as her parents lived at Bury Hill with her grandfather Charles Barclay when she was a young girl.





Chests were an important piece of furniture in the colonies. Chests of all types of wood were used to transport goods by ship, often these were reinforced with iron mounts. Sometimes the sizes of these chests were so large that they could barely be handled. It has been known to happen that ships were overloaded with extra chests and consequently sunk. In 1717, strict regulations were introduced specifying the size and the number of chests that were allowed to be taken on board. Chests from this period onwards were no wider than five feet (approximately 165cm) measured on the inside of the chest. The number and the size of the chests that were allowed to be taken varied according to rank. Officers and non-commissioned officers from the rank of sergeant were allowed the five foot trunk, lower ranks had to make to do with smaller chests. Most of the djatti chests that remain today were luxurious versions of the five foot chest.



Following a European Directive in 2006, the Artist's Resale Right entitles creators of original works of art to a royalty each time their work is resold, with the involvement of an auction house, for 1,000 Euros or more.

This right covers sales of work by living artists and also the beneficiaries and heirs of artists deceased within the last 70 years of the sale.

How are resale royalties calculated?

The artist's royalty depends on the hammer price (sale price without any VAT or Buyer's Premium). The higher the sale price of the artwork, the lower the overall royalty rate.

The royalty is worked out according to a sliding scale from 4% to 0.25%.

Hammer Price	Royalty
From 0 to €50,000	4%
From €50,000.01 to €200,000	3%
From €200,000.01 to €350,000	1%
From €350,000.01 to €500,000	0.5%
Exceeding €500,000	0.25%

What is the qualifying threshold?

An artwork must sell for more than €1,000 to qualify for a royalty. The law defines the price threshold in Euros and, because the exchange rate between the two currencies changes daily, the equivalent in Pounds Sterling must be worked out according to the exchange rate on the date the artwork was sold.

What nationality must an artist be to qualify?

The Artist's Resale Right applies to the sale of artworks in the European Economic Area (EEA). The following countries are in the $EE\Delta$:

Austria, Belgium, Bulgaria, Cyprus, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Slovak Republic, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, United Kingdom.

Artists who are nationals of these countries are therefore generally eligible to receive resale royalties. The nationality criteria only applies to the artist and not to the beneficiaries or heirs.

Are all sales of artwork covered?

The Artist's Resale Right does not apply to all sales of artworks. A royalty is only due if the following conditions are met:

- the artwork is a copyright protected work of graphic or plastic art;
- it is sold for more than €1000;
- it is sold in the secondary market with the involvement of an art market professional (e.g. auction house);
- and it is sold in the UK or another country in the European Economic Area (EEA).

This royalty, where applicable, will be charged to the purchaser. It is exempt of VAT.

INFORMATION FOR BUYERS

Introduction

The following notes are intended to assist bidders and buyers, particularly those that are inexperienced or new to our salerooms. All of our auctions are governed by our Conditions of Business incorporating the Terms of Consignment (primarily applicable to sellers), the Terms of Sale (primarily applicable to bidders and buyers) and any notices that are displayed in our salerooms or announced by the auctioneer at the auction. Our Conditions of Business are available for inspection at our salerooms and the Terms of Sale are printed in the back of our auction catalogues. Our staff will be happy to help you if there is anything in our Conditions of Business that you do not fully understand.

Please make sure that you read our Terms of Sale set out in this catalogue or on our website carefully before bidding in the auction. If your bid is successful, you will be obliged to comply with our Terms of Sale.

Methods of Payment

Lots must be paid for before they are collected. For those attending the auction we ask that lots are paid for on the day of the sale. Methods by which we accept payment are detailed on our web site, including online payment upon receipt of your invoice, and these should be paid by 5pm on the Friday following the sale. We accept cash to an upper limit of 10,000 euros equivalent. We accept credit card payments to an upper limit of £5,000. Usually any cheques will need to be cleared before you can take the goods away.

Collection and storage

All lots should be paid for and collected by 5pm on the Friday following the sale. Commission bidders should check the success of their bids and arrange payment and collection within this time. Please note what the Terms of Sale say about collection and storage. Items not removed by 5pm on Friday may be removed at the purchaser's expense and storage charges of £10 as an administration fee and £2 per lot per day may be charged (plus vat). Please note that we will apply these charges strictly to Furniture purchased in our Homes and Interiors Sales.

Dispatch

We are rarely able to pack and dispatch purchases. A choice of shippers is detailed on our web site.

Agency

As auctioneers we usually act on behalf of the seller whose identity, for reasons of confidentiality, is not normally disclosed. If you buy at auction your contract for the goods is with the seller, not with us as auctioneer.

Estimates

Estimates are designed to help you gauge what sort of sum might be involved for the purchase of a particular lot. Estimates may change and should not be thought of as the sale price. The lower estimate may represent the reserve price (the minimum price for which a lot may be sold) and will not be below the reserve price. Estimates do not include the buyer's premium or VAT (where chargeable). Estimates are prepared some time before the auction and may be altered by a saleroom notice or announcement by the auctioneer before the auction of the lot. They are not definitive.

Buyer's Premium

The Terms of Sale oblige you to pay a buyer's premium at 23% on the hammer price of each lot purchased, except for our Fine Wine and Port auctions when it is 15%. In addition, VAT is charged on these premiums (see below).

VAT

Items in our catalogue may be marked with a dagger † or double dagger ‡, which indicates that VAT is payable by the buyer on the hammer price and the buyer's premium at either the standard rate (currently 20%) or a reduced rate (currently 5%), depending upon the legal requirements relating to that lot.

Lots which do not have either of the above symbols have no VAT payable on the hammer price. This is because such lots are sold using the Auctioneers' Margin Scheme. The VAT included within the premium is not recoverable as input tax.

Inspection of goods by the buyer

As we act on behalf of the seller, we are dependent on information provided by the seller about their goods. We may inspect lots and will act reasonably in taking a general view about them. However, we are normally unable to carry out detailed examinations of lots to check their condition in the way a buyer would do. You will have ample opportunity to inspect the goods. You must inspect and investigate lots that you might wish to bid for. Please note carefully the exclusion of liability for the condition of lots set out in the Terms of Sale at clause 12.4.

Condition Reports

We may be able to assist buyers unable to view by emailing a condition report, but these are based solely on our own opinion and are for guidance only and no responsibility is accepted for their accuracy. Intending buyers are strongly encouraged to view. Condition reports cannot be prepared on the day of the sale.

Electrical goods

These are sold as "antiques" only. If you buy electrical goods for use you must ask a qualified electrician to check them for compliance with safety regulations before you use them.

Export of goods

If you intend to export goods you must find out:

a. whether an export licence is needed; and

b. if there is a prohibition on importing goods of that character e.g. because the goods contain prohibited materials such as ivory.

Bidding

Bidders will be required to register with us before the auction starts. We reserve the right to impose a deadline prior to the auction by which you must register or by which we must receive a commission bid. If you wish to bid on high value lots this deadline may be several days before the auction in order to allow us sufficient time to carry out the necessary checks. Lots will be invoiced to the name and address on the registration form. All absentee bids should be received at least 30 minutes before the auction commences; we cannot guarantee to execute commission bids received after this time.

Telephone Bidding

If you are unable to come to the auction it may be possible to bid on the telephone for higher value lots. Please note that this service is for lots with an estimate of £500 or more. The number of lines is limited so we would urge serious telephone bidding only and ask that you be prepared to bid over the top estimate. It is advisable to leave a maximum covering bid in case we are not able to contact you by telephone. - 17.4 Each of the clauses of these Terms of Sale operates separately. If any court or relevant authority decides that any of them are unlawful, the remaining clauses will remain in full force and effect.


A non VAT registered UK or EU buyer - no VAT refund is possible.
