Kit spent much of his formative years in rural locations and has been fortunate to engage constantly with the local wildlife. His inspiration and work reflects this, with both ideas and materials taken from agricultural sites and the undergrowth.

Kit learned to weld at 15 with a little bit of instruction from people on the farm and at school. He completed a basic welding course at 19, but in the main Kit is mainly self-taught with a few hints and tips along the way.

Growing up on a farm, there was always some readily available scrap steel kicking about. This was a source of free material, and he soon learned to adapt it to his needs. Scrap steel formed Kit's default material to work with, and continues to do so to this day.

Kit's first foray into to sculpture was a fire bowl made from horse shoes, his inspiration being an example of old spent horse shoes being repurposed in old stables. This appealed to Kit's desire to recycle worn or unwanted steel.

'Knowing what my materials were originally designed for, it's clear they are very heavy duty and well-engineered, so ideal for the challenges of fire. I thought it was a shame that all these pieces were regarded as scrap once out of specification, especially as over 90% of the material was absolutely fine. I set about using these materials in my fire bowls and really enjoy breathing a new beautiful life into this old industrial steel."

"I don't mind extravagance but I cannot bear waste"

This resonated with Kit, although really an oxymoron. Certainly it is applicable to his work, which is generally made up of waste material. Once finished the pieces are quite extravagant. His fire bowls are primarily sculptures but having a blazing fire in them brings them to life.

Jordan Britt is a UK based artist who creates sculptures inspired by mythology and folklore, sculptures inspired by predominantly from steel, wood and brass.

Jordan has shadowed various fabricators, engineers, metal smiths, carpenters, leatherworkers and computer cesigners to gain overlapping skills that allows him to create his unique sculptures; learning techniques drawn from traditional blacksmithing, such as casting and sheet metal shaping using a hammer and anvil, to skills from

tanks.

I paint every-day scenes based mostly on candid photographs of people in the city. My aim is to present and defamiliarize the overlooked, understated, fleeting moments in life, imbuing the every-day with a sense of beauty and even grandeur.

As a teenager, I was drawn to photographs from old family photo albums. The moments captured in these images resonated with me both in terms of their untold stories and the visual quality of analogue photography, with its other-worldly colours, unexpected compositions and softening of details. Vernacular photography seemed to contain an unintended beauty and pathos.

Film is another important influence for me in terms of this elevating of every-day subject matter and the telling of untold stories in, for example, the social realism of British kitchen-sink dramas. I am especially interested in pictorial devices, and how these can be used to create a psychological landscape as in the work of directors such as

Andrei Tarkovsky and Wong Kar Wai. By making use of such filmic qualities in my work, a narrative is suggested, one that is left open for the viewer to interpret.

In addition to film and photography, the tactility of oil paint has always appealed to me. Oil paint in the quality of its application - the brushstroke can lend itself well to a shorthand expression of detail which helps create ambiguity and an open narrative, inviting the viewer to guestion what they are looking at, and why the artist wants us to look. The 'every-day' is the main theme of my work, with a focus on city life and more recently on the tension between togetherness and isolation in urban environments. Within this, my paintings gesture towards the ongoing conveyer belt of consumerism: mannequins, supermarket shelves, vending machines, fast food outlets and delivery drivers. I see these as signifiers for the disposable, fast-paced, detached lives we live today.

Harry Cartwright's work takes cues from the worlds of cinema and advertising to create vibrant and evocative mixed-media paintings. These multilayered works combine painting, photography and print-making techniques, blending the artist's own archives with visual references from popular culture to evoke often intense feelings of longing and nostalgia in the viewer. Cinematically stylised, as though viewed through a filmic lens, the works seem to operate as a portal into a sunshine tinted era of times gone-by.

Cartwright graduated his MA Fine Art (2021) from City & Guilds of London Art School with distinction. Since then he has collaborated on projects with brands including Calvin Klein, Paul Smith & Warner Music Group. His works have been exhibited and collected nationally and internationally and have been featured in publications including The Financial Times, Huck and TMRW Magazine.

Responding to an increasingly digitalised world where images and time periods merge and appear in one seemingly eternal present, Harriet Gillett's practice attempts to slow down these increasingly fast-paced encounters into images of reverie. She looks to offer a transitional space that is both within and beyond the viewer's experiences by adopting a surrealistic logic to transform familiar scenes. Blurring the experienced and imagined, she works from quickly sketched impressions often made from life with a slower, intuitive approach to colour and light that allows for a more psychological exploration of time and place. Whilst holding some of its origins in well-known literary and art historical traditions that nod to various time periods, she uses a "rose-tinted" colour palette with fluorescent spray paint at its base. This enables the work to position itself between the past and present, traditional and

contemporary both in terms of its imagery and its materiality.

Paint operates as a metaphor for both instability and potential transformation, allowing for a fluidity of form. Things teeter anxiously at the brink of abstraction, prevented from falling apart. The influence of memory becomes evident in the tension between clarity and haziness; moments of emphatic linework punctuate smoky dreamscapes where figures merge with their landscapes and thin veils of pollutant colour allow things to morph into one another.

Moving between intimate, icon-like honed-in moments and scaled-up, more immersive works that lift motifs from cinema, song lyrics and traditionally devotional symbolism, the works offer a lyrical and romantic exploration of identity and the things that connect us.

Fred Gordon is an award winning British sculptor, who is passionate about wildlife, conservation and the natural world.

Born in 1993, Fred did a Foundation Diploma at Falmouth and has a MA Hons in History of Art and French from Edinburgh University. Having continued to produce work throughout his degree, he immediately threw himself into creating sculpture full-time on graduating in 2017.

With minimal formal training, Fred has learnt through a combination of experience and total commitment. With an acute sense of observation, instinctive approach and striking ability, he captures a real sense of spirit, movement and energy in his work.

Fred has travelled widely to study his subjects firsthand in their natural environment, drawing his subjects from the British countryside and experiences further afield, including Sri Lanka and a three-month artist residency in Limpopo, South Africa.

Working directly from life, Fred sketches, photographs and where possible creates small maquette studies in front of the animals. Looking at their anatomy and behaviour, he takes this

source material back to his studio to work up the pose and form in the final pieces.

Fascinated by the casting process, Fred worked for several years at the foundry casting the bronze first hand. Whilst at the foundry he started experimenting with the foundry casting wax, folding and layering sheets of wax to create form.

With this layered effect, working quickly with the heated plates of wax, there is a spontaneity and an element of fragmentation, hollowness and abstraction in the work.

Rather than create an exact impression, Fred is looking to capture a moment, a nuance in the movement and an instinctive sense of character in the pose. He then looks for greater intricacy in the details and the faces.

Once the wax master is finished, the bronze is cast using the Lost Wax Method; an age-old technique used to create the mould, cast and finish the piece in bronze, which in Fred's case involves one shot at casting directly from the wax itself. Closely involved in the casting process and final patination, Fred finishes the pieces with a marbled patina, using natural grey, green and brown tones to create collages of colour.

Aubrey Higgin was born in Cheshire, UK, in 1993. His paintings have been exhibited in places such as the Dorchester Hotel, London and sold all over the world in places such as Geneva, Santa Monica, Stockholm, Dubai and Rome. Aubrey has a big interest in the impact that art can have on well-being through shapes and colour.

He developed an interest in the arts at a very young age from painting with his grandmother, who inspired his love of art. Subsequently, he was awarded an Art Scholarship. He is a graduate of the BA Art programme at Reading University. His paintings capture movement and energy using vivid colours to portray positivity and vitality. The works focus on colour and texture through layering and removing oil paint, whilst using a palette knife. The idea of motion was inspired by his photography using long shutter speeds. The theme of the unknown was inspired by his battle with an undiagnosed illness for two years, a period in which he developed a keen interest in Damian Hirst and the sublime. His works are a representation of life after illness.

I discovered I had synaesthesia at the age of four while arguing over the colour of the letter 'E' with my mother, who recognised my thoughts since she has it too. While I have only the most basic form of the hundreds that are known to exist, it has an enormous effect on my life both consciously and unconsciously. Patterns, colours, words and numbers are artistically elevated to me and have become surprisingly useful in my own creativity. Aside from this hereditary condition, I have had a visceral need to make marks since childhood, coming home even from nursery to raid the kitchen drawers for pens and paper. Art has become an activity I rely on heavily, whether I like the outcome of my efforts or not.

During the pandemic I suffered greatly from anxiety, leading to a period of deep depression that I have now recovered from thanks to my medication. Throughout this period, lasting fairly consistently over two years, I produced a large amount of work that subconsciously reflected my mental state. During the spring months of 2021, I started a project which involved requesting portrait commissions from both friends and strangers with the tag that 50% of the profit would go to Mind, the mental health cooperation. I produced 20 8"x10" acrylic portraits alongside my A level coursework, which also follows the theme of portraiture. That taught me how to respond to criticism, how to be comfortable with exposing my work, self discipline, time management and an advance in technical skill.

I'm doing a foundation at city and guilds right now but I don't know which art school I will be attending. I am hoping that this foundation with city and guilds will help me decide.

My artwork explores the collision between the natural world and the built environment. Having been surrounded by the Northumbrian landscape during my upbringing in a family which specialises in construction, I often feel caught between both worlds. Captivated by often unnoticed architectural details and geometric shapes, I bring these fragments together to form distorted landscapes and animal portraits. However, the gradual blends

of colour in each fragment aim to restore their sense of identity. With each work expressing a sense of breakdown and reconstruction, I aim to create a sense of balance between the natural subject and its architectural style. My work is heavily influenced by the tranquillity of Franz Marc's animal paintings in relation to the predominantly human subjects associated with Futurism.

Rose Vestey is a London-based artist who studied at the Royal Drawing School and later at the University of Brighton. Rose's morphing elemental worlds move between figuration and abstraction, encouraging her audience to search for pockets of clarity within her distorted dreamscapes.

A great endearment for Chinese Landscape Painting's idea of the animus of nature, her process flits between spontaneous and intentional across media, including painting, printing mosaics and design. Her etchings are particularly evocative of her absorption in Chinese Landscape Painting. The original etching plates of these were made during the Covid lockdowns, which summon a feeling of a natural Arcadia, though never wholly without disquiet.

This compassion towards Eastern art is combined with a sensitivity to the moods and fantastical essences of Bosch and Blake. The union of these representations retains these themes in her triptych, A Series of Woodland Events.

This selection of Rose's work displays the importance of material within her practice. Her work during the lockdown became more muted and internal, though as the world started to open up again, Rose's work is launched into a burst of colourful celebration as she flings herself into her first mosaics.
