CARING Good dog owners

2 in 3 worry about dogs after Covid

NEARLY two-thirds of Scots are worried about what will happen to dogs they bought during the coronavirus pandemic.

The Kennel Club study, part of its Open for Dogs campaign, suggests 64 per cent of people in Scotland are worried the pets will be abandoned when "normal" life resumes.

Across the UK, nearly one in five respondents (17 per cent) admitted they have considered rehoming post-lockdown.

The study also found almost half (49 per cent) of Scots say there are not

enough businesses for pets.

research was "worrying".
He added: "The nation's

dogs don't deserve to be left behind after being there for so many during lockdown."
