Instinct, Scholarship and Curiosity: The Jan Finch Collection

9th & 10th November, Sworders

Sworders begins the new season with a remarkable two-day sale of objects from the collection of pioneering dealer Jan Ellen Finch (1952-2021), who began her 40-year career trading dealer-to-dealer at London's Portobello Market in the 1980s. As her husband, Craig, seeks to declutter, 400 lots have been consigned for sale, with estimates from £100 to £30,000. Guy Schooling, chairman of Sworders, says: 'Under Jan's leadership, Finch & Co became one of the best-known dealerships of the modern era. What began as a traditional dealership evolved into a 'look' based on passion, instinct, scholarship and curiosity." After Jan and Craig married in 1993, their 'wunderkammer' mix of ethnographic art, European sculpture and antiquities became

a regular fixture at trade fairs such as Masterpiece and TEFAF, and the catalogues for their twice-yearly exhibition in St James's were like gold dust. The South Kensington business continues to trade, and with many of its clients based in the EU, Craig is hoping to operate partly from Brussels.

'Sworders' sale amounts to a celebration of many of Jan's life passions,' continues Guy. 'It includes many items of Finch & Co stock, from Roman sculpture to Oceanic war clubs, but also pieces from Jan's personal collection. When at home near Banbury, she was a keen cook and gardener, and a library of hundreds of cookery books will be up for sale alongside garden furnishings, including 20 antique stone troughs."
